Suit back from dry cleanes?

Remember to invade

A treatise on medical ailments of the common Groupus Expaticus, as noted in the northerly provinces of the Kingdom of the Netherlands and certain polar regions of the British Isles

1. Hobanitis

Symptoms; growing lack of commitment to group fun. Extreme version of Calvinism often synonymous with stingy behaviour and an almost complete inability to participate in enjoyable activities. The victim of this disease has frequent hallucinations of family commitments, sometimes to the extent of his future mother in law enjoying birthdays up to ten times per month. 9. Harrison's Curse
